This is a friendly reminder from North Plains City Hall that property owners are responsible for maintaining their property up to the roadways,

including ditches.

Municipal Code 4.10.090(c) states "Between April 1 and October 31 of any year, no owner or person in charge of property may allow noxious vegetation to be on the property or in the right of way of a public thoroughfare abutting on the property. It shall be the duty of an owner or person in charge of property to cut down or to destroy grass, shrubbery, brush, bushes, weeds or other noxious vegetation as often as needed to prevent them from becoming unsightly, from becoming a fire hazard, or, in the case of weeds or other noxious vegetation, from maturing or going to seed."



**ADULTS:** New this year, Library Staff, Library Board members, Friends of the Library members, and Library Volunteers are issuing a challenge to the adults of greater North Plains to reach a goal of collectively reading one million pages by the end of summer – Library Folk versus our Reading Public. ## Those were the good old days...

### A Hole in the Mountain

It is April 21<sup>st</sup> and we are on the road again. In the past years when Mitch Ward was putting out the local Beacon newspaper we were involved in a number of historical adventures. We stumbled into the rough Howling Dog Canyon, overcame wind, rain and stinging nettles to locate part of the runaway locomotive that killed Mrs. Griffles. We overcame wandering difficulties to find the historic Jackson Falls. The effort needed to get to this Hole in the Mountain site tops them all.

Beside many small sawmills in the area, there were three large sawmills up the Dairy Creek Valley. These three mills used a branch line railroad that connected to the united rail line between North Plains and Banks at a town site named Hills Acres. Lots were laid out and some sold at Hills Acres. But, I know of only one house have being built there along a terrible access road in from the county road.

My parents and others have told of a locomotive being moved up the county road to the Sherman Mill. This would lead us to believe the rail line from Hills



Acres was constructed from both ends. My parents had hired man who would take a team of horses and a slip and work on building this railroad. He was paid

\$3.00 dollars a day in the early 1920's.

Pictured is a Shay locomotive similar to one of the locomotives used on the Sherman rail line. These three big sawmills up the valley were the E.J Sherman Mill, the Buckley Mill, and the Pat Murphy Mill. In my younger days I saw all of these mills in operation. There were also spur rail lines built to bring timber to the mills. One of these branch lines ran up quite a ways past Pumpkin Ridge.

Much of the rock ballast needed for the rail led came from a Quarry on a cliff above the Sherman Mill. The rock here was a fractured basalt that, when dynamited broke into just about the right size needed for the ballast. No rock crusher was needed.

This arch and Hole in the Mountain at the quarry could be seen from the county road for years. It is now hidden by trees. I have always wanted to see this landmark and asked the current landowner, Mike Jamieson, who offered to be our guide.


One can stand at this Hole in the Mountain and understand just how simple this quarry worked. You wonder if an engineering wizard laid it out or if it was a stroke of dumb luck. This hole, about seven feet in diameter was probably



created by some smaller blasts. It then served as a funnel to direct the blasted rock some one hundred yards down the steep cliff where it could be loaded.

Any rock that was dynamited from high above, or from either side in the quarry would come down in an avalanche pouring through this hole. It was gravity feed all the way. Even with the thousands of yards of rock that has been taken from the quarry, the resource has hardly been touched. There is a lot of fractured rock still left on that mountain.

Every time I put my foot down on that slope, something would move under it. Mike often kept a hold of my jacket. My legs hurt for two days after the hike in.



The Sherman Mill and the Buckley Mill were located about a half mile apart at a place called Snooseville. This area was 7 miles up the Dairy Creek Valley from the

Mountaindale Stone corner. Mill workers and loggers cabins lined the creek there and filled the woods just below the Sherman Mill.



The increase in families here resulted in an addition being built onto the Meacham School.

There was a shop and truck repair garage that stood on the corner of

the road at Snooseville that was sometimes used to hold dances. The contents of the building would be moved to the side. In talking to an older lady who came to our Senior Center, I found she had attended dances at Snooseville. I remarked "you must have been pretty young." Her reply was "I'll have you know I was married at sixteen and I did a lot of dancing before that." She said the dance at the garage was too rowdy, dancing on the inside, fighting on the outside. She said there was a house nearby where they could dance in peace until the early morning.

I can remember being in the one room Mountaindale School and seeing the lumber train go by just across Dairy Creek. This rail line up to the mills, around 8 miles, was taken out about 1939. During the scrap iron collection drives for the World War II effort, we children would scour the rail bed for leftover iron. We would find spikes, plates and bolts that had just been left there.

I later thanked Mike Jameson for taking an afternoon off to show us the quarry landmark. I could remember seeing it from the road, but never realized the hole was so high up on the mountain. I hope in years to come this story will provide some record of it and this quarry.
